### Prayball

Just like many experienced ball players have times when they struggle at the plate, I, too, am struggling. No, it is not with my faith, nor with my commitment to all things Jewish. And it is certainly not with my relationship to the people of the community that I serve. The slump that I am experiencing is directly related to my personal practice of prayer and how I am expected to provide leadership in this endeavor.

The Executive Board recently released the results of the focus groups that were attended by the majority of the congregation last summer. Many of you made wonderful suggestions as to how we can improve the quality of our experience as members of Temple B'nai Abraham, as well as what we can do personally to make sure certain things happen. One area that attracted much attention on paper was the issue of prayer.

Some preferred more English in the service. Others were most comfortable with the Hebrew. Still others said they would like to participate more often. In other words, there was no consensus on how we should pray as a community. Other synagogues have tackled this problem by offering a variety of Shabbat prayer experiences, even including meditation and yoga as expressions of prayer. Were we a large enough congregation, perhaps we, too, could support such multiple levels of spiritual enjoyment under one roof.

Until such time, this is my struggle. Although people are advocating for change, there are those who show up “religiously” and they enjoy the routine that we have established over the years. Each service—weekday morning, Kabbalat Shabbat, Shabbat morning, and Sunday morning—has its participants. How do we protect their level of spirituality and connecting to God while introducing change?

Change can be disruptive in its attempts to be more inclusive. I have a copy of the revised Reform siddur, and I admire some of the inspirational readings that have been inserted. Writer Paul Greenberg, however, is less complimentary. In a recent opinion piece, he writes, “Whoever’s constantly revising the Reform Jewish prayer book keeps moving the spiritual furniture around, redecorating the hallowed old rooms, and generally refurbishing the sacred. And then they wonder why people don’t feel at home.”

It is not surprising how we become attached to the familiar. I had a similar difficulty moving from the old Silverman siddur, with the *thou’s* and the *shalt not’s* that were a part of the spiritual vocabulary of my youth. When I went off to college, Sim Shalom was the new standard with its modern translations, and Likrat Shabbat and its liberal interpretations had become a community standard. The new Sim Shalom includes a page that includes the *immahot*—our foremothers. A colleague of mine suggested this page should have been set with perforations to be easily removed!

However, the majority has spoken and he has been overruled in that regard.

Even the English words have a power over us that is not to be underestimated. “They become custom, tradition, home,” says Mr. Greenberg. And I agree. My Simchat Torah is very much incomplete without the singing of *The Angels Come A-Mustering* that can be found in the back pages of the black-bound prayer book of my youth.

Yet, a time has come for me to move on in my spiritual life and adapt to a new style of praying. While I may find something to admire with each new publication, what I am discovering is that nothing is as important as The Word that was recorded by our sages centuries ago. The English readings may speak to the faith of this generation, but I have yet to be convinced they are as timeless and as enduring as the original words of the siddur, the ones that are in Hebrew.

There is a certain rhyme and rhythm that is a part of the way a person prays. And the mode changes with each service. According to Jewish mysticism, the Shabbat evening is devoted to Shabbat as a bride. Shabbat morning, the melodies are devoted to Shabbat as a groom. Shabbat afternoon, the melody changes once again, to reflect the union of the two.

The prayer book is not just a testimonial to God. It is a reflection of our history. It speaks to us of the time when we were exiled in Babylonia as well as of our coming home. It speaks to us of both the rewards and the punishments that Israel has received in servitude to God. Then there are the prayers that speak about being raised up and of being given hope in times of trouble.

Those who stay away from a prayerful life because they cannot associate with the prayers and the language are missing a very important aspect of what Judaism has to teach us and the world. Those who have crossed that threshold have discovered how equally difficult it is to stop coming and being part of a community that supports one another in prayer.

I confess that in my struggle with the prayer book I might not be as tolerant to change as I once thought, at least when the spoken words of the Hebrew are concerned. The melody, however, is a different story. Not all the tunes that we chant need to be from Sinai, as they say, in order to convey a sense of continuity with the past. For my sin of not being as flexible as some people would like me to be, I ask for forgiveness:

“Avinu Malkeinu, Our Father, Our King, forgive me for the sin of judging my prayer so harshly.” Or, as one might translate that into the language of the gender-neutral, politically correct siddur: “Our Parent, Our Elder, forgive me for being so judgmental!”

### A Reminder About Our Cemetery

Now that warm weather has returned and Memorial Day and other civil holidays approach, it is appropriate again to point out some of the customs and rules pertaining to gravesites at TBA's cemetery.

The presence of flowers at funerals and gravesites is distinctly a non-Jewish custom and is actively discouraged, if not prohibited, by the Conservative movement, its rabbis, and member congregations.

TBA bylaws and cemetery rules prohibit the decoration or marking of any gravesite in any manner, other than with standard gravestones, without specific permission of the Cemetery Trustees. In particular, no grave may be decorated with plants or flowers or other vegetation, be they live or artificial, potted or planted, or cut and placed in the ground to appear as if they are growing. Such items will be removed and disposed of by cemetery personnel.

The Jewish custom upon visiting the gravesite of a loved one is to pledge *tzedakah*, either to a favorite charity of the deceased or to the Temple or cemetery. (Donations to the cemetery are always useful and appreciated for maintenance and general beautification.) Some also follow the custom of marking the visit by placing a small stone or pebble on the grave marker. A container with small stones for this purpose can be found just inside the cemetery by the center paved walk.

The gravesites of those known to have been military veterans are decorated with flags prior to Memorial Day, courtesy of the Goldberg-Zassman Post, Jewish War Veterans. Omissions should be brought to the attention of the Temple office.

Finally, the cemetery is open to visitors during daylight hours daily, except for Saturday and other Jewish holy days. The center gate (only) is unlocked and easily opened and closed.

Please inform family members and friends who may visit our cemetery of the above-noted customs and cemetery rules.

### Budget Approved With 'Share Plan'

Temple members at the March 30 Congregational Meeting approved an operating budget for the 2008-2009 fiscal year that leaves dues and tuition unchanged but institutes a new "share plan."

Under the plan, each household will have a "share" in providing new revenue to the synagogue. The share requirement was set at \$300 for family memberships and \$150 for single memberships. Each household's share may be fulfilled in a number of ways, such as by sponsoring an Oneg or Kiddush, purchasing scrip, bringing in a new member, or writing a check.

The Temple leadership will distribute a list of ways that members may meet their share requirement. The fiscal year begins on July 1, 2008.
